

How to Write a Manifesto - Elections Guide

Why do I need to write a manifesto?

When you submit your nomination, you need to include a picture, a slogan, and your manifesto.

What is a manifesto?

A manifesto explains what you stand for and why people should vote for you in elections. This should include positive changes that you would like to make for your constituents. If you don't have a clear manifesto, students may not wish to vote for you, as they won't know what you want to do if you are elected.

What should be in a manifesto?

A manifesto should include:

- 1) a short summary of who you are;
- 2) an overview of any experiences that would make you a good candidate for the position you're running for (e.g. volunteer positions you've held); and
- 3) an outline of what you would like to achieve if you are elections.

The manifesto that will be shared on the Strath Union website has a word limit of 250 words.

How do I know what to put in a manifesto?

Your manifesto points should be about making change that will have a positive impact on students' lives. To decide what to include you should think about:

- 1) Your experience
 - a. What has affected you that you would like to change?
- 2) The experience of students you know
 - a. Think about your course-mates, housemates and other students you know what would improve their student experience?
- 3) Local and national issues
 - a. Things going on in locally and nationally, such as climate change and cost of accommodation, affect students if you were elected, what could you do about these issues?

Any final tips?

- 1) A manifesto is not a cover letter or application, so we would recommend avoiding long paragraphs and sentences. Students may not have time to stop and read over every manifesto, so the easier to understand, the better.
- 2) It can be tempting to includes lots in your manifesto sometimes including too many promises can be seen as unrealistic or confusing. Keeping your key manifesto points to 3 to 6 main areas is a lot easier to communicate
- **3)** When designing your manifesto, keep it simple and consistent. Think about whether the information is easy to read, both on screens and in print.
- 4) Don't forget that you can also use your manifesto as a platform for campaigning for example, you can use individual points in promotional posts.
